Curator's Corner

Year in Review

In January the museum expanded its gallery space by installing seven new displays cabinets at the entrance of the building. The museum utilized this new space by showcasing more of our great collection to the public. Both new and old, our new displays' artifacts educate our visitors on all aspects of the sport.

By March the museum debuted a new instrument to our roller skating music collection. Procured by George Pickard and Richard Hawkins, both board members, the museum debuted its 1906 Gramophone. Used in smaller parlor rinks, the Gramophone played records by energy obtained through a hand crank. The Gramophone is sponsored by the Anderson Family.

In April, former world champion artistic skater Rob Ferendo agreed to donate six prints of his paintings to the museum. Ferendo used various oils and acrylics to compose roller skating themed paintings.



In May the museum held its annual fundraiser raffle. One grand gesture boosted the raffle ticket sales this year. Our long time board member Frank Cernik decided to retire from the board of trustees this year at age 85.

To "go out with a bang" as Frank put it, Mr. Cernik decided to match every ticket sold at the President's Dinner the last night of the convention up to 100. With the buzz of this announcement, the members of the RSA in attendance of the dinner really stepped up and came through for the museum. During the dinner the museum sold 117 tickets! Frank and his wife Phyllis then matched with a contribution of 100 as promised. This pushed the total ticket sales to 444 tickets sold, a number not reached in many years. A special thanks and our deepest gratitude go to both Frank and Phyllis Cernik.

In August our wonderful museum board member Dominic Cangelosi generously donated his personal Hammond B3 Organ to the museum; in addition he included a matching Hammond speaker and a Leslie speaker. After setting up the organ, he entertained a small crowd with a short concert, covered by the local news. Thanks again Dominic!!!



Beginning in mid September, the museum undertook a large-scale photograph reorganization project. It became twofold. First, George Pickard and I made sure each photograph in the collection contributed to a greater understanding of the sport and its storied history. Second, we organized the photographs into categories.

Finally the museum ended the year with a membership outreach. Most of our past members renewed for another year and some new names are entering as well. We expect a continued increase for our efforts.

In the fall of 1906 the Akron Skating Rink Company, under President W.F. Stickle, opened the brand new roller skating hall called East Market Street Rink.

The Akron Skating Rink Company put in charge of the rink five individuals deemed as the executive staff. These folks included:

The following are excerpts from its grand opening program:

Roller Skating in Akron

Having demonstrated last season that a high-class, moral, and properly conducted roller skating rink can be successfully operated, we will open our East Market Street Rink (the finest and most thoroughly equipped roller skating academy in the state) on Saturday evening, Sept 29th, with new Winslow and Union Hardware Ball Bearing skates, beautiful oriental decorations, and everything as nearly up-to-date as it is possible to obtain.

A Six Months' Carnival of Pleasure

The rink will be open continuously for skating every evening and Saturday afternoons during the month of October. Beginning with Monday, November 5th, afternoon sessions will be given daily (Sunday excepted) with an extra session Saturday mornings for ladies and children. Careful attention to all details in connection with the enterprise is guaranteed and every objectionable element will be eliminated. The patronage of only those who conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the strictest propriety will be solicited and none but those known to the management to be acceptable patrons will be allowed the privilege of the rink.

New Management with Efficient Service

The rink will be operated under a new management; our attaches have been selected with the greatest possible care and only those of irreproachable character will be employed. All those desirous of learning to skate will be given special attention by competent and trustworthy instructors. Gentlemanly conduct from the manager to the skate boy is the rule. The ladies' parlor will be in charge of a competent maid at all times.

Special Attractions

In addition to the regular skating sport there will be held, from time to time, appropriate and special skating contests, expert skating performances, mask and fancy dress carnivals, races and other unusually good vaudeville features. No effort or expense will be spared to make the season rich in pleasure and health-giving sport.



2.) Early Roller Derby Items:
